I'm here to teach you about calling 9-1-1.**

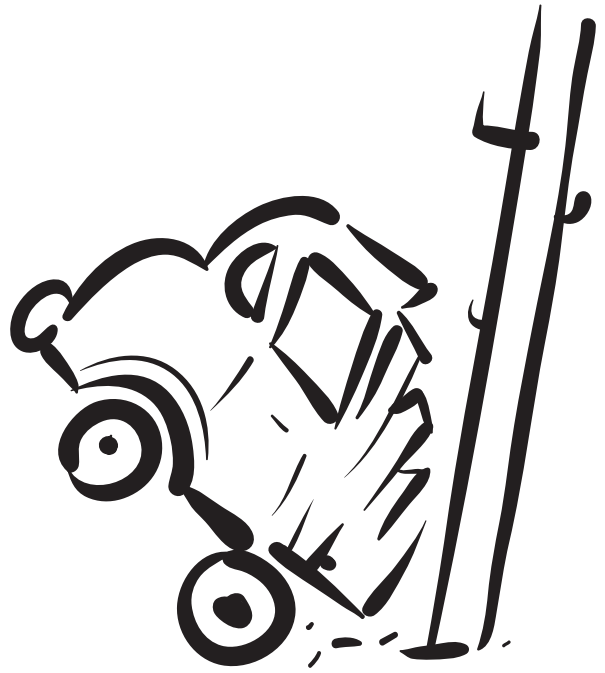


**Call 9-1-1 if you have a police, medical or fire emergency
and need someone to come help you right away!**

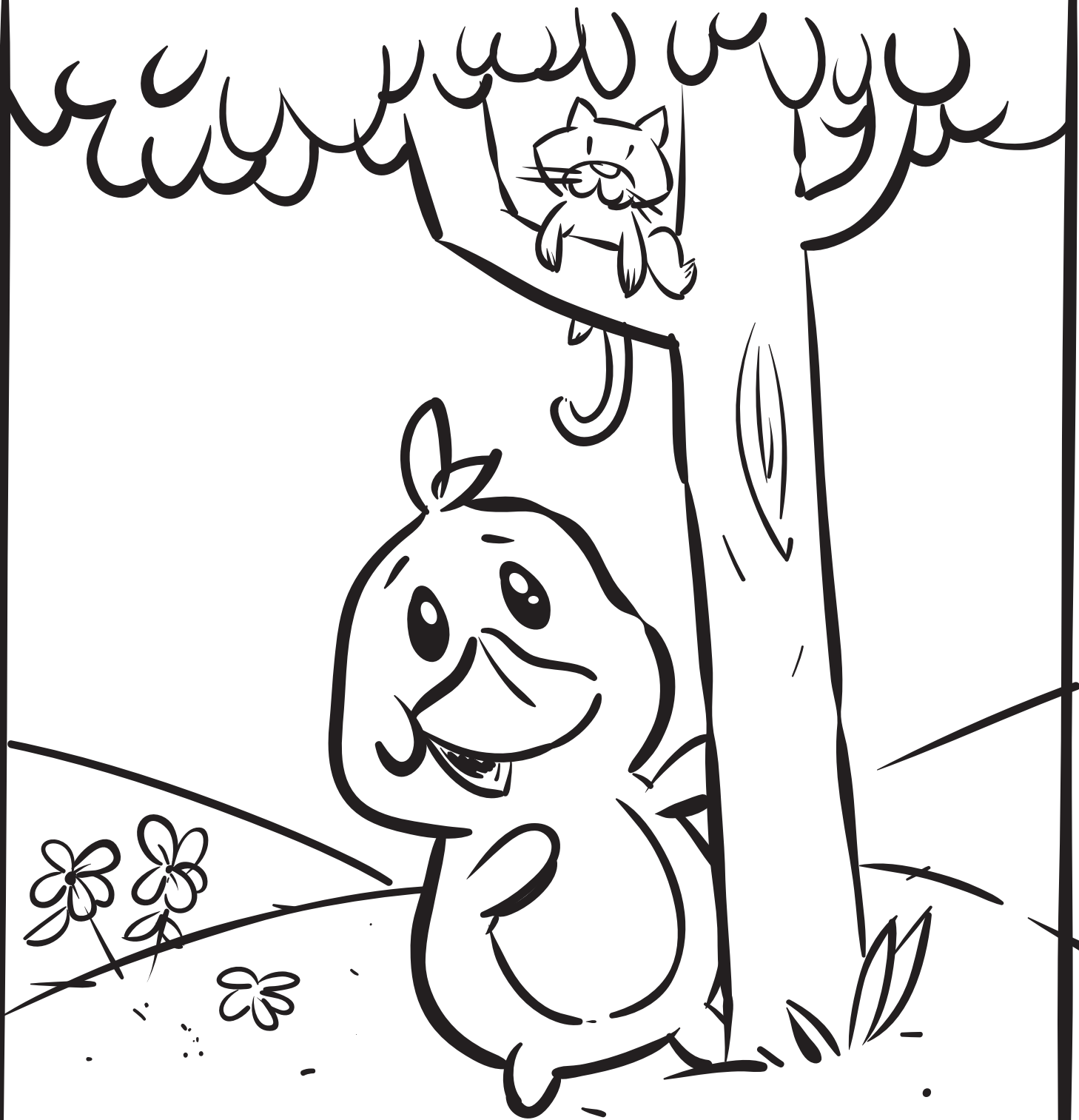

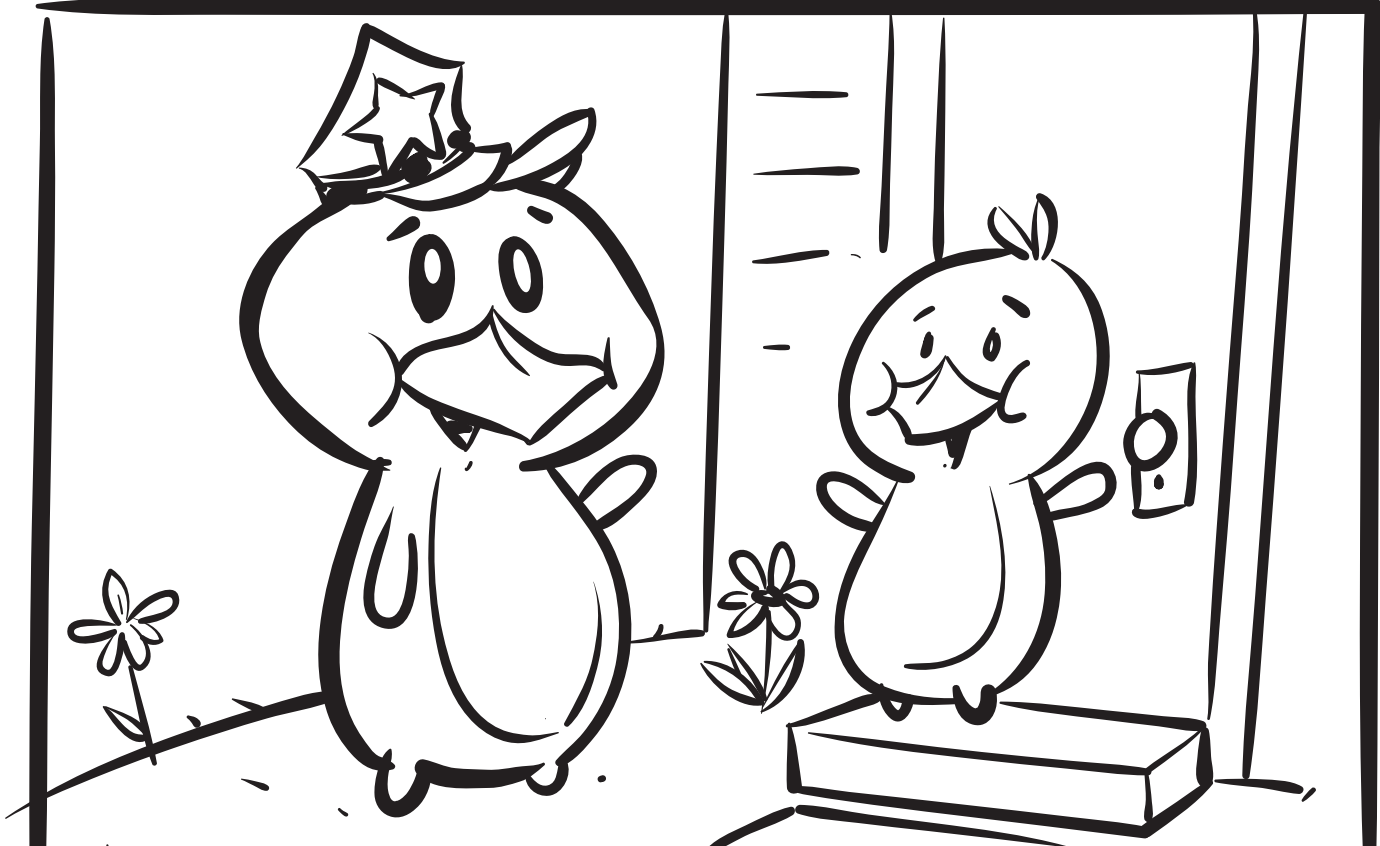
**Call 9-1-1 from a home phone or a cell phone.
Dial 9, then 1, then 1 again.**



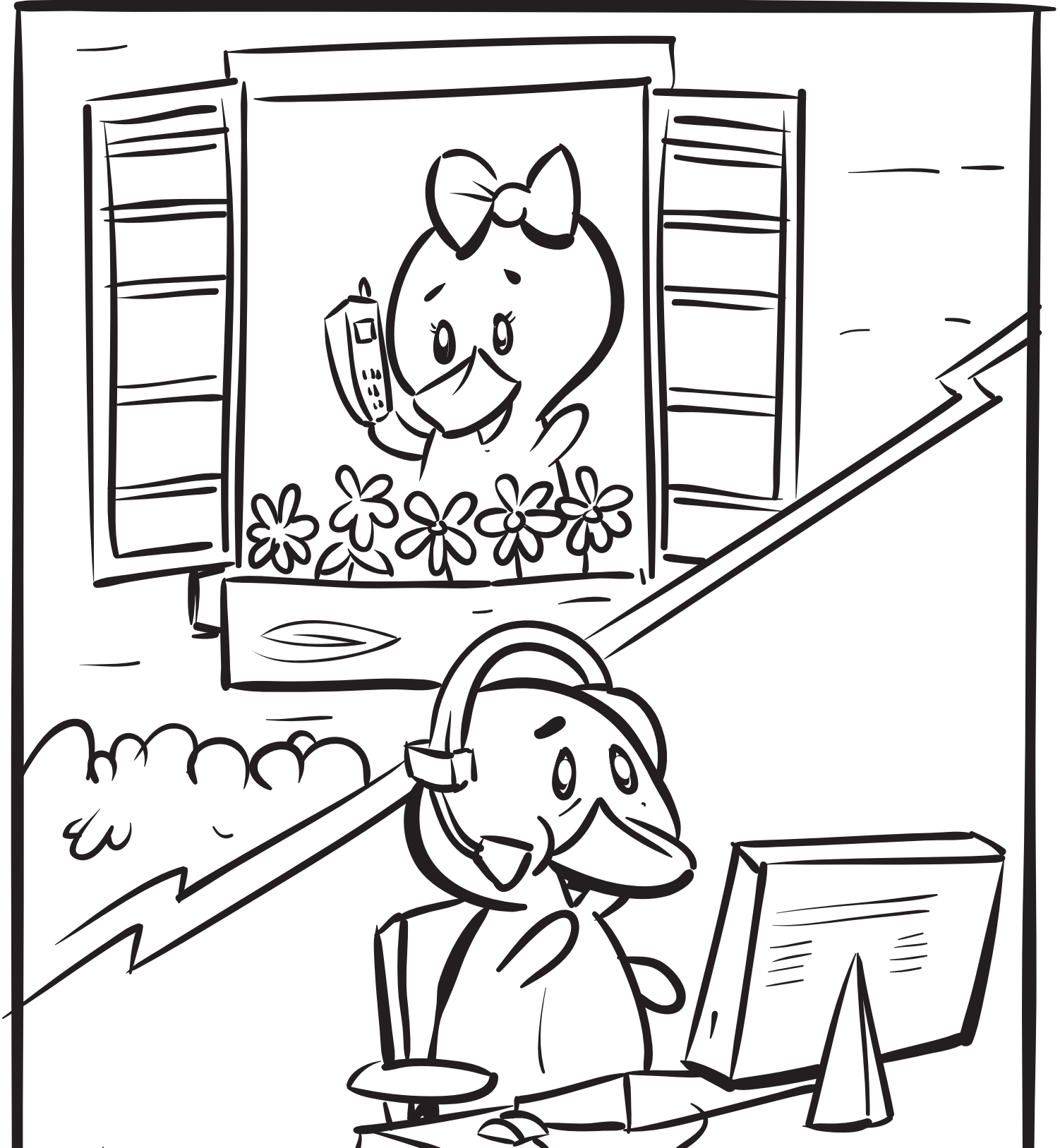
Call 9-1-1 when you see a house on fire, someone who is badly hurt, a car crash, or any emergency.



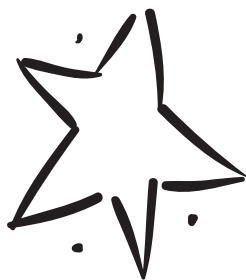
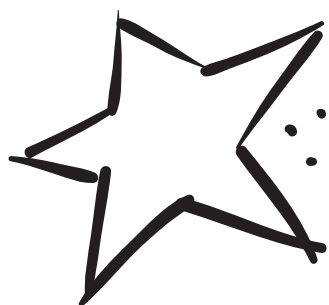
What's not an emergency? Things like a cat stuck in a tree or when the power goes out.



If you get lost, call 9-1-1 and police officers will help you get home.



**Even if you call 9-1-1 by accident—stay on the phone!
Wait until the call taker tells you it is OK to hang up.**
