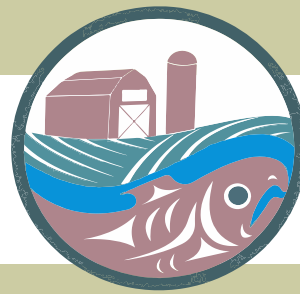

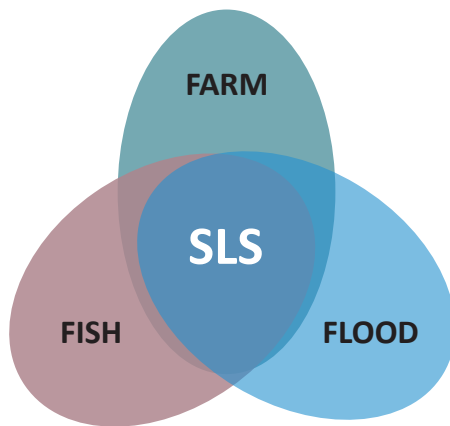

Sustainable Lands Strategy in Snohomish County

Working together for farm, fish and flood net gains

We need to manage our floodplains and ecosystems wisely, so we can grow food, have abundant clean water, recover our fisheries, and protect communities from flooding. To meet these requirements effectively, communities must work together on complex issues and achieve outcomes that meet the needs of diverse stakeholders. By focusing on multi-benefit strategies, long-term solutions in the floodplain are able to be achieved with efficiency, broad support, and high impact. Sustainable Lands Strategy (SLS) in Snohomish County works together for farm, fish and flood net gains.



Elements of the Multi-benefit Approach:

- **Trust and cooperation** among traditionally opposed interest groups
- **Strategic coordination among partners**- including municipal, state, and federal agencies, tribes, farmers, NGOs (TNC, Forterra, Farm Bureau, etc.), water management districts, and community groups.
- **'Net gain' packages** of projects and other measures that address fish-flood-farm priorities
- **Integrated and targeted** actions at the reach or sub-basin scale
- **Community-based projects** with broad support
- **Efficient and effective** process improvements

SLS Funding Requests:

\$61.5m

- **Floodplains by Design** to support integrated, multi-benefit floodplain management strategies

\$4m

- **Increased funding for the Washington State Conservation Commission** to leverage NRCS federal funding and support agricultural interests and protect resource lands

\$10m

- **Estuary and Salmon Restoration Program** to help design and integrate projects and coordinate Sustainable Lands Strategy

A strong state portfolio will enable locally supported actions that will make our communities more vibrant and resilient.
