My suggestion would be to divide the property in 1 to 1/2 acre sites for mansions with their own moorage and possibly a helicopter pad. We certainly have enough wealthy people and it would make a lot more sense.

My other suggestion would be to have one-way traffic out of Point Wells on R. B. drive and one way in off of 116th in Woodway. This certainly would change the traffic concern somewhat, however, to have approximately 3000 people and 6000 plus cars is a form of insanity, all because the the greed of the County for taxes. This is prime property and can never again be replaced and to ruin it with your plans is truly unbelievable.

I personally have maintained this right of way for 38 years, have filled in the ditch, black topped it and paid for every penny spend, plus the landscaping and maintaining the property with watering and beautifying the King County, Shoreline area. I will expect a reimbursement for time and money spent.

There should be a law for reverse possession after all these years, something I plan to explore.

I also raised funds for the underground wiring and the sidewalk on the east side of street, with ditch being filled in, so we as property owners would have a place to walk. We as property owners paid for the underground wiring, however we petitioned King County to provide a limited walkway. It took the County five years to do this work and it took 5 years to obtain the underground wiring from Seattle City Light, It was not easy.

This project is causing a civil war in Shoreline, Richmond Beach and Woodway. Shoreline making decisions that affect us without a proper vote from the citizens.

What more can I say, other than this will destroy our property values, but most likely will not lower our taxes.

I plan to fight this project in any way that we as a neighborhood are able to do.
