THREE LEVELS OF INCLUSION

Inclusion of individuals with disabilities is a value of healthy communities and defined as having three levels.²

1. Physical Integration

Ensures that a person’s right to access is recognized and assured (mandated by the Architectural Barrier’s Act of 1968 and the Americans with Disabilities Act). This level is a prerequisite to the following two levels of inclusion.

2. Functional Inclusion

Functional Inclusion refers to an individual’s ability to function within a given environment. Facility staff members must have adequate knowledge and resources in order to appropriately adapt their activities for this level to occur. Once a community accomplishes the first and second levels of Inclusion, they may then move forward to the third, Social Inclusion.

3. Social Inclusion:

Social Inclusion is the highest level of inclusion; it cannot be mandated, it must be internally motivated. It is defined as “one’s ability to gain social acceptance and/or participate in positive interactions with peers during recreation activities.” (Schleien, et al. 1999, as cited in Nolan, 2005)
